After reporting yesterday that universities were giving full-feepaying students preferential treatment, the Herald was inundated with allegations from academics nationwide saying they

had been told to downgrade courses and regrade full feepaying students.

ing their careers would be damaged if they spoke out. Others said all essential decisions were taken by administrations, and meetings had no public minutes. Dr Ted Steele, an Associate Pro-

fessor at Wollongong University, Australia's University of the Year, said he had been told to increase the grades of honours students.

"When I was phoned to give

the student a reference for further study I had to tell the truth and say the student simply wasn't up to it.
