

Social Alternatives provides a forum for the analysis of social, cultural and economic oppression and focuses on the development of alternative proposals to effect social change towards greater freedom and democracy. Whilst emphasizing such alternatives there is no intention of denying the importance of clarifying the theoretical framework by which social and political issues are discerned and examined.

Social Alternatives aims to expand its major focus beyond purely Australian problems and issues towards those of the developing and developed countries of the Pacific region. A further objective is to analyse such problems in the context of global concerns.

Social Alternatives is characterised by an approach to social and political issues which is experimental and radical. The emphasis of the journal is intended to be interdisciplinary in the broadest sense. It is hoped that Social Alternatives will provide for an integration of academic and literary work relating to social policy issues and social change. The following themes are suggested in this context and will be an ongoing concern of the journal:

> Peace Studies and Research **Industrial Democracy** Inequality and Poverty Social Control Mechanisms

Social Welfare Media Mental Health The Environment

Sexism Racism Crime and the Law **Educational Innovation**

Contributions on other relevant topics would be welcome.

Social Alternatives welcomes enquiries from people interested in contributing articles, literary work, book and film reviews, graphics and photographs, news of conferences, criticisms of articles, or other material relevant to our objectives.

Articles should be comprehensible to non-specialist readers and contributors are asked to avoid esoteric academic terminology where possible. All manuscripts are evaluated by the editors and outside referees where appropriate. Manuscripts are accepted subject to non-substantive editing. In general articles of between 1,500 and 3,000 words are preferred. Please include a brief biographical note for publication together with summary not exceeding 200 words. Graphics and photos accompanying articles are appreciated.

Preparation of manuscripts. Manuscripts should be typewritten with double spacing and liberal margins. Please submit THREE copies. Camera ready artwork should be supplied for all diagrams. For general style conventions please consult Style Manual for Authors, Editors and Printers. Canberra Australia Government Printing Service, latest Edition. In particular please note the following:

- frequent or lengthy quotations should be indented; no quotation marks are then required;
- English Australian rather than American Australian spelling should be used.

Format of References. All references to books, articles and other sources are to be identified at the appropriate point in the text as consecutive bracketed numerals with the list of references placed at the end of the article in an appendix labelled 'REFERENCES'. For format see the following examples:
